

Book Review

The featured book for February/March is <u>Animals Should Definitely NOT Wear Clothing</u>. It was written by Judi Barrett and illustrated by Ron Barrett.

This is one of the funniest books I have found in quite awhile. A variety of animals are given different articles of clothing only to be pictured showing what a silly and disastrous predicament that would cause. A camel would not know whether to wear hats on his head or his

humps. Flowered pants would keep the hen from being able to lay her eggs. The moose's antlers would get caught on suspenders. A giraffe would need too many ties to cover his long neck. And, the opossums might wear their outfits upside down. Each explanation and illustration will bring giggles from your little one.

Animals Should Definitely NOT Wear Clothing would be a great addition to your child's collection of books.





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Simple Snowflakes-

- -white coffee filters
- -child safety scissors

Show your child how to fold a coffee filter in half and them in half again. Have him cut small triangles out of the folded edges. Help him unfold the filter to discover the snow flake!

Frosty Pictures-

- -Epsom salts
- -water
- -paintbrush

Have you child draw an outdoor picture on a piece of colored construction paper. Make a solution of half Epsom salts and half water. Let him use this mixture to paint on the picture. When the mixture dries, it will leave sparkling crystals on the paper.

My Special Valentine-

- -large heart shape (cut out of construction paper)
- -old photos and pictures from magazines
- -glue

Give your child a large paper heart and help him to create a valentine filled with all the special people he loves. Let him glue faces from old photos (family members, pets, etc.). You can also use a magazine to gather clippings of special foods or toys that are special to him!

When to Cancel your Child's Appointments with the Infants and Toddlers Providers:

- If your child has a fever of 100° or more the day of your appointment
- If your child has diarrhea or has been vomiting in the last 24 hours
- If your child has a painful sore throat; red and watering or crusty eyes; open sores; or is in obvious pain
- If your child has been diagnosed with strep throat or pink eye, and has not been on antibiotics for at least 24 hours from the first dose
- If your child has a bad cold or cough; the first 24-48 hours of a cold are the most contagious
- If any other child in your home is not going to school because they are sick, or adults are not going to work because they are sick



Turtle Bread



Ingredients:

2 1/2 to 3 cups of all purpose flour

1 package of quick-acting active dry yeast

1tbsp of sugar

1 tsp of salt

1/2 cup of water

1/3 cup of milk

1tbsp of margarine

1 egg

2 raisins



- 1. Mix 1 1/2 c. of the flour, yeast, sugar and salt in a large bowl.
- 2. Heat water, milk and margarine to 125°, stir into yeast mixture. Stir in egg. Stir in enough of remaining flour to make the dough easy to handle.
- 3. Sprinkle a surface lightly with flour. Turn the dough unto the surface, knead until smooth and elastic about 5 min. Cover and let rest for 10 min.
- 4. Lightly grease a cookie sheet. Shape a 2 inch piece of dough into a ball for head. Shape 4 walnut size pieces of dough into balls for feet. Shape 1 walnut size piece of dough into a tail. Shape remaining dough into a ball for body; place on cookie sheet and flatten slightly. Attach head, feet and tail by placing one end of each under edge of the body to secure. Press raisins into head for eyes. Cover and let rise for 20 min.
- 5. Heat the oven to 400°. Make crisscross cuts in body 1/4 inch deep to look like a turtle's shell. Bake until golden brown 20 to 25 min. Makes 1 turtle bread.



Bonding with your baby: The Importance of Attachment

What is attachment?

Good attachment is the deep long lasting bond between your child and you during the baby's first several years of life.

Why is attachment so important?

The early attachment years greatly affect everything about your child throughout his life. Attachment affects your child's mind, body, emotions, relationships and moral values. Children who receive warm and responsive care giving and who form secure attachments:

- ◆ Cope with stress and difficult times more easily when they are older
- Are more curious
- Develop independence
- Get along with other children
- ♦ Form long-term relationships
- ◆ Trust authority figures
- ♦ Have empathy and compassion
- ♦ Perform better in school
- ◆ Know how to attach to their children when they become parents

Secure attachment provides a child with:

- Safety and protection
- ◆ Basic trust that will influence all future emotional relationships
- The ability to explore his environment safely and securely which leads to a curiosity for learning
- The ability to manage his impulses and emotions
- Feelings of confidence and self-worth
- Empathy, compassion and conscience
- ◆ The ability to be resilient and resourceful
- Defense against stress and trauma

How do I go about providing this attachment?

- ◆ The best way is through touch. The most powerful way to establish human relationship is through loving touch, one of our most basic needs. For instance, breastfeeding provides loving skin-to-skin touch and excellent nurturing.
- ♦ Hold and handle your baby safely.
- Make eye contact. This helps your baby's brain grow while teaching him to make eye contact and to have positive communication.
- Smile at your baby. Smiling helps the baby feel safe and secure while providing warmth, joy and love.
- ♦ Have a positive attitude
- ♦ Meet all of your baby's needs

What happens if attachment goes wrong?

When a child fails to receive loving, protective care many problems can occur that will interfere with his healthy development. These attachment disorders in children can include:

- Inability to develop and maintain friendships
- Anti-social attitude and behavior
- Aggression and violence
- Inability to be intimate or affectionate
- Feelings of rejection, pain, fear and anger
- ♦ Low self-esteem
- Negative self-perception (for instance a child might think "I am bad.")
- Mistrust of authority
- Being needy, clingy, and fearing independence
- Having poor control of stress and lack of selfcontrol

Ask for parenting help

Don't feel bad if you need to ask for help. Raising a child is the hardest work you'll ever do.


